August 1, 2006 - Holiday - No Meeting

Newer member, Jeff Buchanan, made a great greeter as he welcomed members and guests to today's meeting.

Joe Mullins began the meeting on time as he stepped into President Barb's role. Joe explained that Barb had taken a week's vacation to help her sister-in-law move from New York to Cleveland. (Barb's sister-in-law was married to Barb's late brother who died in the 9/11 attacks.) After Cliff Johnson gave the invocation asking that America, Tasha, our exchange student, and our members' special concerns be lifted in prayer, Joe had members introduce their guests, among whom were Jean's grandson and our Rotary exchange student, Tasha.

Rock then led the club in singing, choosing "Sing Rotarians," and of course inserting the more generic term of "guys." He also led a second tune of R-O-T-A-R-Y.

Dick Loveless gave his personal profile. Dick started out by saying he had wore a suit and tie for too many years and he wasn't going to do that anymore. He said he was born in Xenia and graduated from Xenia High School; he attended undergraduate schools and was in the military service for 3 years from 1942 to 1945. He said, like Harry Johns, he was recently awarded the Medal for the Battle of Normandy. Dick has held numerous offices in many organizations to include the Chamber of Commerce, 1st Reform Church, Old Fashioned Days, Shawnee Park, Greene Memorial Hospital, Wright State School of Medicine, and many, many more. Dick began as a Rotarian in 1954, is a Paul Harris Fellow, has attended four international conventions and has been Secretary-Treasurer of the Xenia Club since 1985. He has been married to Genny for 58 years and has 3 sons.

Ron Geyer then assumed his role as Sergeant at Arms. He indicated he didn't have much to bring up as all his newspaper clippings referred to members who were absent. He began by fining everyone a dollar who wasn't wearing long sleeves. He asked Vet Brett whether he was glad it was only 102 degrees at the fair. Brett said all was going well at the fair and that some chickens were being lost in the heat, but that the pigs, cows and sheep are doing ok. After some discussion about having a "fried chicken" fundraiser, Ron asked if anyone had happy bucks. Mark said that the Greene County Combined Health District will also be having a golf tournament – see him for details. Gretchen gave a happy buck for being here and not in Kansas where it has been 105 degrees! Joe then announced that Paul Loveless (Dick's son) was the 52/50 winner and that Tom Swigart won the attendance prize.

Joe then said Tim Haney had some good news and some bad news for us. Tim indicated that the exchange student from Peru had decided at the last minute not to participate in the program. Therefore, we will not have a Rotary student this year. However, we will be sponsoring a student, Tasha Mills. Tasha

then came to the podium and began to speak to the club in Japanese. She then indicated that she is currently a Xenia High School student and she is looking forward to going overseas to Japan to study in their culture. She said she is looking forward to leaving next week and spending the next 12 months there. She said she felt this was a wonderful opportunity that will give her skills she can use the rest of her life.

John (Rick) Williamson was program chair and Brad Montgomery introduced the speakers, 1st Lieutenant Glenn Conley and Cadet Peter Corcoran from the Xenia Cadet Squadron of the Civil Air Patrol. The speakers explained that they are civilians who support the Air Force through volunteer activities. The Xenia unit was chartered in 1985 and currently has 8 senior members and 12 cadets, who meet each Tuesday evening. Cadets have four phases they go through: learning, leadership, command and executive. Cadets go through a boot camp, which has been in place since 1947 and consists of drills and obstacle courses and stresses confidence and teamwork. Cadets also have color guard and drill team competitions and participate in special activities, such as national emergency, powered flight, glider flights and cadet officer school in Alabama. The Civil Air Patrol prepares cadets to become future leaders. Cadets take an oath to serve faithfully, attend meetings, wear the uniform proudly, and to be of service. Both discipline and moral issues are stressed in training. Part of the mission is to participate in search and rescue of persons and downed aircraft. Their past support was in the 2000 tornado where they assisted local police with parameter security. They also helped officials in the mid-90s when there was flooding in Zanesville. Responding to a question, Cadet Corcoran indicated that the Civil Air Patrol gets some funding or use of facilities from the Air Force, the Boy Scouts of America, the Junior ROTC and, at national level, from corporate sponsors.

Tom Zajbel presented today's program of Larry Schweikart a professor of history at the University of Dayton, specializing in business and economic history, technology and war issues, and American history. He received his Ph.D. at the University of California, Santa Barbara. In 2000, Schweikart published *The Entrepreneurial Adventure*, a history of American business. He has also published more than 20 books, some 50 academic articles, close to 100 book reviews, and hundreds of essays. He spoke today about his book, *America's Victories: Why the U.S. Wins Wars and Will Win the War on Terror*.



Why do Americans win wars, and why is it all but certain we will win the War on Terror? The biggest answer is that, far from being a cruel, bloodthirsty nation, eager to acquire other people's resources, we value the sanctity of life more than any military culture in history. This fundamental trait has led, over the last two centuries, to more humane treatment of prisoners, more daring POW rescues, and more effective operations than any comparable power.

The American military has also benefited from a combination of other virtues: the ability to learn from losses and mistakes – a part of the free enterprise system; the unique autonomy entrusted to our troops; our force of free citizens- mostly volunteers, our affinity for technology, the services cooperate with each other and the constant improvements forced by anti-war protestors. He contends that the American journalist and our opponents have always underestimated the quality of our soldiers.

Did we really lose in Vietnam? Who was our enemy? Ho Chi Min? No, the Soviet Union. And who won the cold war.

Don Anderson introduced the program for the day - our own Mike Stephens, President/CEO of Greene Health Partners. Mike gave a very informative presentation about the Greene Health Partners Strategic Planning Update for Greene Memorial Hospital that included the following:



- GMH's mission is to provide quality healthcare service for Greene County
- Who do they serve? Residents of Greene County. The Greene Health Partners System has approximately 1000 employees and has an impact of approximately 107 million dollars on the local economy.
- GMH is a 53 year old facility that is in need of approximately 12 million dollars of repairs to the mechanical systems (HVAC, plumbing and electrical) in the building.
- Looking forward GMH has a decision to make as to how to be the best stewards of their resources in serving the residents of Greene County. Should 12 million dollars be spent on an old facility that is in a location that is doesn't have the best visibility or accessibility? Or can the money be spent more wisely to build a new facility in a better location? These are questions that the Greene Health Partners Strategic Planning Committee has spent many months in trying to answer.
- Among the challenges faced are competition for market share from other healthcare providers; keeping quality physicians; remaining financially viable.
- GMH's designed future vision is for clinical excellence; providing a magnetic culture for employees, physicians and patients; financial strength.
- Why is GMH looking at changes? 1. Competing hospitals and other healthcare providers are moving into our primary market area. 2. Need to make a significant investment in the current facility. 3. Current location doesn't match up well with the location of county population. 4. Upgrading current facility doesn't add new services. 5. Need to add physicians in order to grow services. 6. Need to be accessible to patients in service area.
- GMH must develop programs of value and quality.

President Barbara gave a long intro for our speaker, Steve Austria as he has not been around for the newer members to know him. Steve was elected in 2000 to represent the 10th Ohio Senate seat comprised of Clark, Greene and Madison counties. Previously he served as our state house representative 1998-2000. He has had perfect attendance voting record. This past year he was elected as the majority whip to guide legislation through the senate. Married to



Eileen they have three sons which Steve likes to coach in soccer, basketball and baseball. He has been a Xenia Rotarian since 1998. A grad of Carroll HS and Marquette University, he is a financial planner when not working full time in Columbus.

Steve wished to focus on Ohio Economy today stating that has been his focus since arriving in 2000 when the economy was at a low point. In 2002 he was appointed chair of the Economic Development and Small Business Committee. He traveled the state with his colleagues finding that the main concerns of individuals and small business were that Ohio seemed to have no jobs plan; civil justice system needs improvement from frivolous law suits; taxes were not competitive with other states; government spending out of control; need to provide adequately for education; and needed healthcare reform especially Medicaid.

They began passing legislation to cover these areas. Third Frontier for technology improvement and new jobs is a result. Tort Reform finally passed after being held up by the state house for 1½ years. Last year a Tax Reform bill passed lowering state income tax across the board by 21% over a five year period. The Rainy Day fund has been replenished and the state is in the black allowing income tax reductions at a faster rate. Revoked the temp ½% sales tax, reduced Medicaid spending. Passage of Issue 1 allowed for technology expansion with much money coming to the Miami Valley. Issue 2 money is helping roads throughout the county and townships.

Two future areas of concern are Medicaid and education reform. Medicaid spending has been changed allowing for home healthcare versus nursing homes expense. Medicaid was rising so fast that \$0.60 of every new \$1 raised was going to that funding. Education changes are being implemented from the Blue Ribbon Panel’s recommendation. But the next two years are critical as a change in Governor and term limits on all new legislative officers will take place.
