They have thirteen staff members some of whom are part time. Last year they provided 650 seniors services at \$1,250 each. Their funding comes from a five year Greene County Senior Services Levy for \$2.6 million that comes up again in 2009. Clients paid \$115,000 in co payment last year.

Besides doing needs assessments and providing services they also look a Bigger Issues. This summer they are sponsoring a seniors and driving event funded partially from a grant. The goal is to not get seniors off the highway but to provide information from physicians, insurance companies, driving assessment, driving education and alternative transportation for seniors.

John LeBlanc gave a testimonial on caring for his in laws now staying in Cedarville. Saying that Clark County does not provide these services. You do not know how difficult care giving is until you must do it yourself.

He has also served on the Greene County Fair board for 22 years and serves on the board of Greene Oaks. Keith was our club president in 2002-2003.

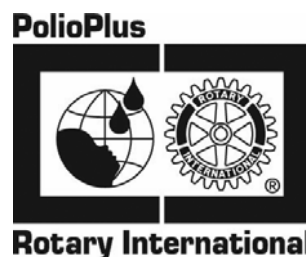

President Barbara had requested Eric Fogarty to head up the RI Foundation and our own Xenia Rotary Foundation Committee to get the ball rolling. Eric presented a brief over view of the RI Foundation and Polio Plus.

The RI Foundation has contributed more than US\$600 million to the polio eradication activities in 122 countries.

Before eradication efforts began in 1985, polio paralyzed more than 1,000 children a day, which totaled about 350,000 children annually. The incidence of polio has since declined by more than 99 percent. Only four countries are still polio endemic — an all-time low: Nigeria, India, Pakistan, and



Afghanistan.

In 1985 our club had a goal from RI of \$7,000 and we raised \$38,000! Thanks to "The Colonel" Stephen chairmanship (Pete's father) who would never accept a "No" when he came a calling.

The Xenia Rotary Foundation was started in January 1992 while Eric Winston was President of the club to help fund local and international projects. The local foundation could help supplement our annual fundraising and allow for larger projects. Today we have \$4,000 in the foundation. Thus, we have raised roughly \$266/year over the last fifteen years. Eric believes that we need have a clear cut plan and set specific goals for larger projects or we will have missed an opportunity to serve the community.



Eric envisioned raising \$100,000 in ten years. If every member paid in \$.25/week - \$1.75/week - \$22.50/quarter - \$90/year or \$900 over ten years we will have raised \$100,000! Commitment forms were passed out to complete to offer the members to get started. Dick will even add to your quarterly bill. An open discussion followed but ran out of time before too much detail was proposed. President Barbara wants to form a group to move the local foundation forward. Married 32 years to Susan Buell and they have two grown daughters who now live in North Carolina. A past president in 1989-90 and a Paul Harris Fellow, Kevin failed to mention his active community activities with the Xenia Chamber and Xenia Schools over the years.

Many said it did not help his looks any. Happy Bucks from Terry Hall whose son was in auto accident and lucky it was not worse. Visiting member Noel McKeown made an appearance saying now 120 pounds lighter and more to go. Brad M happy daughter moved out of house to new job at Cincinnati Insurance. Program chair Neil Fogarty brought Pastor Jim Wilson today from Troy, Ohio. Pastor Jim a United Methodist pastor and United Theological graduate has served four churches and now is at Troy First Methodist Church since 2001.

Two years ago he was asked to participate in a mission trip of pastors to Nicaragua. Someone heard of Jim's son, Bradley, who is in a persistent vegetative state due to an illness he contracted when he was only a few weeks old. He is 17 years old and lives in a nursing home. He was asked to visit a local woman who was a "little different" as she speaks to the animals. Hesitantly, he said Ok. After talking briefly she showed him her prayer room and spoke of her serving God. She told of her program to help handicap children using a horse. Jim felt called to do something.



After returning home he told the story to others and donations came forward from 350 families in 16 states to build *Bradley's House of Hope* in Nicaragua for the children to have a home to learn. The offering was not made at his church but as an individual.

Jim showed a short video clip of the ground breaking in May 2005 and completion of the first floor in December 2005. The second floor was started in December 2006. Sixty five kids now used the facility where 12-15 kids used a grass hut previously. More modern therapy and basic skills is now being used giving hope to the families. They also teach trades to the mothers to provide income and stability to the families. A full time American Director is on site. Although administered through a Christian missionary group, Good Samaritan Foundation, they reach out to all faiths.

Personal Profile came from newer member Jeff Buchanan. He began telling a story of a WWII Marine wounded on Okinawa who married a Marine sergeant who became his parent. His

father lost one eye at Okinawa but continued a career as a political cartoonist at the Columbus Citizens Journal. Jeff brought some cartoons and drawings his father did as a combat artist with the Marines. Jeff played on a state champion football team at Upper Arlington, wrestled and ran track but no scholarships. His family insisted that Jeff and brothers "earn" their way working a variety of jobs in high school and college. Jeff came to Wright State studying rehabilitation and worked on campus fixing wheelchairs and assisting disabled student on campus.



His first real job was a member of the "Rat Patrol" for the Greene County Health Department after the '74 Tornado under a two year grant. His wheelchair repair experience paid off with a job as a service manager for Corey Orthopedic and Medical Supply. Jeff started a small business installing aids and lifts in vans. Finally graduating from Wright State in 1977 he worked for the Ohio Rehabilitation Services Commission as a counselor and supervisor. In 1984 returned to the private sector as a manager of a home health care division for a medical equipment company increasing sales 400% in six years.

By 1991 Jeff was burnt out and started Victory Amusements, a party a rental and planning business. They provide a variety of products and services for corporate, community, and private parties. Tents, chairs, concessions, games, giant inflatables are some of the products. Married to wife Linda, a Special Ed teacher at Warner Middle school, they have three grown children and two grandchildren. Jeff is a Fairborn Jaycee past president, district governor, state program manager and U.S. Jaycee Ambassador. Passions include fishing, travel, family activities, and sports.

Cliff led a couple of songs reminding us that "Guys" is a generic term for men and women... so use that in the songs when it says men as we have women in Rotary. Guest Sarge was Barry Baker unhappy today as he was rear ended by a 50ish man driving a mini van. If you are over 50 and drive a mini van pay a dollar! Brett Ellis wearing a sport coat and tie (and Levi's) was program chair introducing Tom McCann, a semi retire business man, horse raiser and consultant. Tom spoke on *China- Growing influence, Growing Power*. Using a power point presentation of several slides he presented several startling facts and trends of the "New China". Tom projected that China would be the dominant power of the 2000's.



- Population equals 1.3 billion - the world's most populous country representing 20% of the world population with just 6% of the arable land.
- We export to China machinery, machines parts, soy beans. But import computers, telephones, office machines,

toys, consumer electronics. The average worker earns 5-10% of our workers. The trade deficit to China is over \$934 million

- China is the 2nd largest oil consumer. The demand for oil price is up 33% from 2001 to 2004. They are financing oil pipe lines in Afghanistan, Canada, Africa, and South America. If we finance your pipeline you sell us oil first.
- Internal challenges include having 10-13 million people move from rural to urban areas each year. Overwhelming the infrastructures. Water and Air pollution is at very dangerous stages. But they do not value individuals as the western world. The One Child Rule caused 114 males births to 100 females. With normal at 105 to 100. If use 10% that is 100 billion more men than women. Chinese culture values the family and having children.
- Military power and growth is staggering. Their military budget has grown 12% per year over last eight years. A small article in local newspaper showed the Chinese had shot down one of their satellites at 500 miles above the earth. Image the disruption to the world if other countries military and civilian satellites were shot down?
- Challenges to the United States- what will be our role in the changing world with china as the dominant power.
- Need to fix our education system not just throw money at it.
- Need to create a National Purpose.... That 's when we all come together under one cause as in the past.
- Purpose today was to get us to think about the future not only to us but our children and grandchildren.

ABC's of Rotary

Rotary Mottoes

The first motto of Rotary International, **He Profits Most Who Serves Best**, was approved at the second Rotary Convention, held in Portland, Oregon, USA, in August 1911. The phrase was first stated by a Chicago Rotarian, Art Sheldon, who made a speech in 1910 that included the remark, "He profits most who serves his fellows best." At about the same time, Ben Collins, president of the Rotary Club of Minneapolis, Minnesota, USA, commented that the proper way to organize a Rotary club was through the principle his club had adopted — **Service, Not Self**. These two slogans, slightly modified, were formally approved to be the official mottoes of Rotary at the 1950 convention in Detroit — **He Profits Most Who Serves Best and Service Above Self**. The 1989 Council on Legislation established **Service Above Self** as the principal motto of Rotary, since it best explains the philosophy of unselfish volunteer service.

ABC's of Rotary

100 Percent Attendance

Regular attendance is essential to a strong and active Rotary club. The emphasis on attendance is traced back to 1922 when Rotary International announced a worldwide attendance contest that motivated thousands of Rotarians to achieve 100 percent attendance year after year. Many Rotarians take great pride in maintaining their 100 percent record in their own club or by making up at other Rotary club meetings.

Although the bylaws of Rotary require members to attend only 60 percent of all meetings, the custom has emerged in many clubs that 100 percent is the desirable level. Rotary stresses regular attendance because each member represents his or her own business or profession and thus the absence of any member deprives the club of the values of its diversified membership and the personal fellowship of each member. Club directors may determine appropriate reasons for excusing absences. From time to time, proposals have been made to give attendance credit for various reasons or to lower the minimum requirement, but such attempts have not been adopted by the Council on Legislation.

In 2001, the Council approved the creation of a New Models Rotary Clubs pilot project to develop up to 200 new clubs that were more responsive to the needs of younger professionals. The new models clubs are allowed to operate outside the Standard Rotary Club Constitution and Bylaws. Many of these clubs have altered their meeting frequency and relaxed attendance requirements. If the pilot clubs prove successful, the 2004 Council on Legislation could adopt policies making these innovations permanent.
